The following activities are recommendations and suggestions that link to the learning that is happening in Sapphire Class at school. Please aim to complete **one activity per week** and hand in on a day of your choice.

<p>Research the different jobs during WW2 and design a poster or advert persuading people to become either a soldier, a billeting officer, a nurse, factory worker or a member of the home guard.</p>	<p>Find out where children were evacuated from and to in Britain. Think how you could show this on a map.</p>	<p>Research the fashions, hairstyles and makeup during WW2 and compare these to modern day giving your opinions on these.</p>	<p>Make do and mend – create a toy using only recycled materials! It could be made from wood, material, plastic etc.</p>
<p>Research and write facts or a biography about a significant individual in WW2 e.g. Anne Frank, Winston Churchill, Franklin Roosevelt, Alan Turing, Adolf Hitler etc.</p>	<p>Talk to relatives or friends of the family who were alive during WW2. Write down their stories (check you've recorded these accurately). Share any exciting stories with the class.</p>	<p>Write instructions or an advice leaflet for citizens to follow during an air raid in WW2. Look online at examples.</p>	<p>Create a graph comparing the size of armies in WW2 from different nations.</p>
<p>Learn a wartime song and perform it (to friends/family or create a video to share with us).</p>	<p>Research a painting that shows WW2 – what does it tell you about the time?</p>	<p>Make your own WW2 wordsearch or crossword using the vocabulary you have learned.</p>	<p>Research a WW2 recipe and make it at home. Photograph it and write out the recipe. Write a review of the meal (or collect reviews from those who ate it!)</p>
<p>Glenn Miller was a popular Jazz composer in the early 1940s. Find out 5 pieces he wrote and look at the instruments he wrote them for.</p>	<p>Draw and label a great airplane from WW2 – e.g. a British Supermarine Spitfire</p>	<p>Research old British currency (money) and write some WW2 maths word problems using these. Create a worksheet to test your friends!</p>	<p>Recommend pieces of art that show different things about WW2 to go in an art gallery.</p> <p>Design a WW2 themed game – it could be a board game, card game or something else. Write instructions to go with it so anyone can play!</p>
<p>Find out the cost of rationed items. How much would it cost for a week's food? Can you plan a weekly menu for your household, sticking to your rations?</p>	<p>Soldiers invaded beaches along the coast of Normandy and used the light reflected from the moon to guide their way. Find out which phase of the moon would be best for landing and why.</p>	<p>Research and play games that children would have played in the 1940s. Take photos or videos to share.</p>	<p>Design and build a model of an Anderson Shelter</p> <p>Read a WW2 book and write a detailed review of it</p>
